>>> WELCOME NEW TUTORS

We welcome six new tutors to our Augustine family: Rene Burns, Betty Padrick, Laura Denniston, Ruth Mcree, Barbara Ritchey, and Evelyn Sheahan. All successfully completed the fifty-hour Augustine initial training, learning to teach science of reading topics such as phonemic awareness, phonics, fluency, comprehension, and vocabulary. They have been placed in a Transylvania County elementary school to work 1:1 with a qualifying student and are changing children's lives.

Augustine Literacy Project currently has nineteen volunteer tutors serving twenty-three Transylvania County students. Tutors serve students attending all five Transylvania County elementary Schools (Brevard Academy, TC Henderson Elem., Rosman Elem., Brevard Elem., Pisgah Forest Elem.), Rosman Middle School, and Brevard High School.

Augustine Literacy Brevard held its second adult spelling bee last March 25,2023 at The Lumberyard. Sixteen teams registered for what would be a fun filled, quite competitive fundraiser. The lively evening was enjoyed by many as they sampled dinner items from El Queruebin food truck and beverages from Up Country Saloon. There were many silent auction items with some fierce bidding taking place. At the end of some intense, good natured competition the event proclaimed a tie between Smells Like Team Spirit (Brevard Middle School) and Bee-chy BA Bulldogs (Brevard Academy). >>> COMMUNITY OUTREACH By Kathrine Polmanteer

In spring 2023, The Augustine Literacy Project, Brevard College Childhood Education students, and Brevard Elementary School collaborated to introduce SPARK (Sharpening Phonemic Awareness and Reading Knowledge) to identify at-risk first graders. After a one-day workshop and introduction to the Key Learning Center Building Blocks for Literacy intervention materials presented by ALP, the Brevard College students and their professor completed 12 intervention lessons with the first graders over a six-week period at Brevard Elementary.

Pre and Post screening results indicated that the SPARK intervention had positively impacted the first graders' knowledge of phonological awareness. The college students noted their growth in knowledge and understanding of phonological awareness as well as increased confidence in classroom management, data-driven instruction, and practitioner research.

What does volunteering with Augustine Literacy Project mean to me?

I took the Augustine Literacy training in 2018 and have tutored multiple children since then using the Augustine materials and instruction.

I enjoy working with children. They are so excited to be working with an adult that gives them one on one individual attention. Many children do not have these types of mentor relationships. The quality of training that a tutor receives is extensive, with hands on materials, and step by step instruction that will allow you to be a GREAT teacher.

Watching the growth that children make and the confidence they display warms my heart. The hugs that I receive brighten my day. You can see the joy in their faces when they advance to the next step in the program. Following a systematic approach with many multisensory materials and positive reinforcements from the tutor is the backbone of the Augustine approach.

BRINGING LIGHT TO THE LITERACY CRISIS

Augustine Literacy Project (ALP) partnered with Center for Spiritual Wisdom (CSW) to present *Right to Read*, an eye-opening documentary on the alarming literacy crisis in our community and across the country. This community event shed light on the pressing issue of low literacy rates among children in Transylvania County and the need for both a change in the way reading is taught in schools and for appropriate teacher training in the Science of Reading. The event was held on Sept. 12 at 6:00 p.m. at Brevard College.

Across the nation, including Transylvania County, schools are struggling to equip our children with the fundamental skills needed to read, and a movement is taking place to transition from whole language instruction to the science of reading method. In 2023, only 50% of third to fifth-graders in Transylvania County are reading at grade level (reading proficiency is even lower for low-income, black, Hispanic, and mixed-race students). As these statistics come to light across the country, a movement is taking place to change the way children are taught to read.

Right to Read depicts the compelling story of an activist, a teacher, and two American families who are tirelessly fighting to ensure our youngest generation receives the essential foundation for lifelong success: the ability to read. It unravels the dire consequences children face when they lack these crucial skills, including increased risks of incarceration, homelessness, and unemployment. One of the film's central figures is Kareem Weaver, an Oakland-based NAACP activist, who staunchly declares literacy as one of the greatest civil rights issues of our time.

Following the film, Wendi Adair, Executive Director of ALP Brevard, posed questions to each panelist and moderated a lively and informative panel discussion with audience questions from local educators, Transylvania County librarians, and others in attendance. The panel included: Carrie Norris (Director of K-8 curriculum in Transylvania County); Samantha Osteen (Brevard Elementary Reading Specialist); Courtney Morgan (Adjunct Professor at Brevard College); Carrie Erb (Orton-Gillingham Specialist and Executive Director of Key Learning Center in Asheville); and Tyree Griffin (NAACP Executive Committee and Community Center Director for the City of Brevard).

On a personal note, it is exciting as an Augustine tutor to see the science-based instructional methods Augustine has always used extend to students statewide due to state legislation supporting research-based instruction. While there is still work to be done in the area of teacher preparation to administer the new curricula, progress is being made. I was proud to see ALP-Brevard amplify its impact on the community through its collaboration with CSW, Brevard College, and local stakeholders. It was truly a team effort, and was encouraging to see people come together as a concerned whole around this important issue.
